





# Introduction

"But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof." (Romans 13:14)

Preparing for the Savior's work is a noble endeavor; perhaps the greatest objective of the dedicated Christian life. Those who choose to surrender to the



will of God are exhorted by the Scriptures to allow Him to direct every part of their lives. Leading others to this same position requires a meek and humble spirit which willingly "put[s] on the Lord Jesus Christ" so that one can say with the Apostle Paul, "*Be ye followers of me, even as I also am of Christ"* (1 Corinthians 11:1).

ENGLAND

Christian education involves the entire life. Of course, the academics in the classroom are of great importance; however, most Bible college graduates agree that other areas of their college experience were just as significant. The chapel and church services, the opportunities for ministry, the social times, the athletic events, the dining hall conversations, the work schedules, and the dormitory relationships all comprise the complete college life experience.

Living, working, and studying with others from various backgrounds are wonderful opportunities. But in order for the entire college program to honor Christ and draw each student closer to Him, certain guidelines have been found to be advantageous. The desire of the faculty and staff of New England Baptist College is to create an environment where serious students of the Bible are continually encouraged to seek the will of God for their lives and follow it with their whole heart. It is in this spirit and for this cause that these guidelines are set forth.



Our History and Purpose

In November of 2002, God impressed Dr. Jim Townsley, the pastor of Central Baptist Church, with the vision of establishing New England Baptist College. As he shared this opportunity with the deacons and congregation, the idea of a Bible college in New England and for New England, though an enormous undertaking, was eagerly embraced by the church body. In October of 2003, the church voted to establish New England Baptist College. In subsequent monthsa dormitory was built and the doors opened September 7, 2004 with twenty-three students.



The goal of New England Baptist College is to train young people to minister in Baptist churches. In order to fulfill this objective, the college has specific courses of study designed to effectively prepare Christian men and women to serve our Lord through local Baptist churches in the pastorate and associated ministries, missions and evangelism, Christian school teaching, music, and church office management. One of the Bible verses that give the church this responsibility is: And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also. -2 Timothy 2:2

New England Baptist College stands unashamedly for the KJV Bible; for holy separation unto God and from the world; and for the fundamentals of the faith. The Great Commission of our Lord Jesus Christ (Matthew 28:18-20) is our mandate to preach the Gospel to everyone in every place.



The stance of New England Baptist College is based solely in the Holy Scriptures (2 Timothy 3:16) as preserved in the King James Version and illuminated by the Holy Spirit of God (John 16:13). God, the Creator of the universe (Genesis 1:1-2:25), instructs us to "*study to shew thyself approved*" (2 Timothy 2:15) and has directed that we are to "*have dominion…over every living thing*" (Genesis 1:28). These commandments and others make the church responsible under God to train our people (Proverbs 22:6) in every area of knowledge so that they are prepared for His use in propagating the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ (Matthew 28:18-20). Therefore, every course of study and every individual class is designed to prepare each student to follow the Lord in some area of Christian service through the local Baptist church.

# Our Practice

The key to education is the teacher. Jesus stood before the multitudes and taught them the eternal truths of the Word of God. His methods were simple, but effective; direct, but compassionate. Learning always requires time and effort. The constant feedback from student to teacher provides the mind-searching exercise which is required for lessons to become integral with the life of each student. The courses of study are designed to include strong academic experience with enough practical exercise to provide education which is easily transposed into the solutions of everyday challenges. Everything that is learned should make the Christian better able to fulfill the great commission. Only Christian teachers who are living examples of biblical Christianity, separated from the world and winning souls to Christ, are allowed to teach in New England Baptist College. Students must be members of Central Baptist Church (or a church of similar faith and practice), striving to live holy, separated lives, and participating in weekly soul winning ministries.





# Ouv Promise

Although we cannot promise that those who study at New England Baptist College will succeed in the ministry, we can promise that each student will have the opportunity to learn from Christian teachers, in a Christian environment, truth from the Word of God. Our teachers and staff are dedicated to the task of helping students learn how to win souls, teach Sunday school classes, hold Bible studies, preach sermons, lead youth groups, direct children's church, operate bus routes, serve as missionaries, teach in Christian schools, work as secretaries, direct music programs, or minister in many other areas.

Statement of Faith

We believe that each word in the Bible is inspired by God and that it is the final authority in all matters of faith, doctrine, and practice. We believe that the Bible reveals God, the fall of man, the way of salvation, and God's plan and purpose through the ages. All faculty, students, and chapel speakers will use the King James Version of the English Bible.

We believe that there is only one true living God, existing in three persons: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

We believe in the deity, virgin birth, and bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We believe that salvation is "by grace", plus nothing and minus nothing. The conditions to salvation are repentance and faith.

We believe that men are justified by faith alone and are accounted righteous before God only through the merit of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

We believe in the personal, visible, and premillennial return of our Lord Jesus Christ.

We believe in the everlasting conscious blessedness of the saved and the everlasting conscious punishment of the lost.

We believe that the Holy Spirit convicts of sin, converts the repentant, seals God's children and endues them with soul-winning power.

We believe the so-called charismatic experience is both a doctrinal and practical error and therefore, neither to be sought nor practiced.

We believe in the independence of the local church as an autonomous company of baptized believers. It is the divinely created agency through which God allows believers to keep the ordinances, enjoy fellowship, and evangelize the lost.

We believe because of the current trends in theology, that as a fundamental college, we must take a separatist stand regarding teachings that lead to the discrediting of the Bible and the undermining of the fundamentals of the faith. These errant doctrines include Neo-Orthodoxy, Neo-Evangelicalism, Ecumenicalism, Hyper-Calvinism, and the Charismatic Movement.

We believe that the so-called contemporary music movement is unscriptural. Traditional hymns and conservative gospel music will be used exclusively in the church services, chapel programs, and the music departments of the church and college.

We believe that man was created in holiness as biological male and female. We believe that God has commanded that no intimate sexual activity be engaged in outside of the marriage between one naturally-born biological man and one naturally-born biological woman.

Admissions Procedures

After completing and sending in your application (See pages 82 & 83), we will send you several forms to complete for acceptance. All of these forms may be found on our website at *www.newenglandbaptistcollege.com*.

- 1. Complete the STUDENT INFORMATION FORM. This survey will aid us greatly in providing opportunities for you to serve the Lord while you attend New England Baptist College. Please fill out the survey completely and return it to New England Baptist College.
- 2. Request your academic records with the TRANSCRIPT REQUEST. Request that the high school you graduated from send an official copy of your high school academic record showing the date of graduation. If you have completed the GED, the official scores must be sent to New England Baptist College. If you are presently completing your final semester, request that your official transcript be sent after the final grades are recorded. If you are applying to transfer from another college or university, follow the instructions on the TRANSCRIPT REQUEST.
- 3. Distribute the PASTOR'S RECOMMENDATION and both GENERAL RECOMMENDATION forms. All applicants must have these three forms completed as instructed and returned to New England Baptist College.
- 4. Complete the STUDENT HEALTH PROFILE. This form must be completed by the applicant and returned to New England Baptist College. It must be received prior to your acceptance.
- 5. Any dormitory student desiring to be considered for the WORK SCHOLARSHIP program must complete the included request form. It would be helpful to submit the form at least two weeks before registration day.

Unless you are applying to transfer from another college or university, please request to have your SAT/ACT scores sent to New England Baptist College.

We are honored that you would consider New England Baptist College as your place of training. Once the Admissions Office has received the forms listed above, a decision will be made concerning your acceptance. A letter regarding your status will be sent to you as soon as the admissions procedure has been completed.

Conditional fees may apply depending on the academic program and personal circumstances of the student determined on an individual basis.

### DORM DEPOSIT

A dormitory deposit of \$100 should be sent to New England Baptist College by July 15 for students enrolling for the fall semester and by December 15 for students enrolling for the spring semester. This deposit will guarantee dormitory space and will be credited to semester payment at registration. The dormitory deposit is non-refundable. After August 1 and January 1, rooms are assigned on a space-available basis.

## STATEMENTS

A statement of the student's account will be sent to to the student each month. If a student desires to know the status of his account, he may make a personal visit to the Finance Office during regular office hours.



# FINANCIAL TERMS

The tuition/room and board total is divided into 4 semester payments. The first tuition/room and board payment as well as all applicable fees are due at registration. The remaining 3 payments will be due the first day of each ensuing month.

\*Textbooks, laundry, and incidental personal expenses are typically about \$350 per semester, but will vary with the individual. \*Prepayment in full of Tuition, Room & Board, and Fees for the entire term earns a 2% discount.

## **REFUND POLICY**

- 1. After official withdrawal from classes has been made through the Registrar's Office, a refund request must be submitted in writing to the Finance Office. The date of withdrawal will be the last date of recorded attendance as identified by the Registrar's Office. The parent or guardian must make the request if the student is a legal dependent.
- 2. If a student does not begin classes, the applicatoin fee and the dorm deposit will not be refunded. Other refunds will be made within 30 days after receipt of written notice that the student will not be attending classes.
- 3. The following charges will be assessed in cases of withdrawal from college after commencement of classes, regardless of the reason:

If a student feels that he may qualify to receive financial assistance through New England Baptist College scholarship funds, he must complete and submit the Application for Financial Assistance and/or the Request for Work Scholarship. Work Scholarship determinations will be based on the need of the student and the need of the college. Work scholarships, when available, earn up to \$2,050 per semester and require approximately 15 hours of work per week.

Campus Housing

A beautiful dormitory is provided on campus as part of the room and board program. The state-of-the-art three story dormitory has a comfortable atmosphere and ample living space for each student. Single undergraduate students under 23 years of age from outside the immediate Southington area must live in the dormitories.

# Standards of Conduct and Dress

The purpose of the New England Baptist College is to prepare Christians to

serve as leaders in various Baptist Church ministries, leading others toward righteousness and holiness. Leaders, by the very definition, must be willing to exhibit standards of conduct that are above reproach and that will not cause others to stumble.

Leadership requires sacrifice, determination, humility, and the application of scriptural principles to one's



life. It is important that each student willingly follow the rules and guidelines set forth by the New England Baptist College.

Among the rules are these:

- 1. Students will attend church services Sunday morning, Sunday evening, and Wednesday evening each week at the Central Baptist Church (or other approved church).
- 2. Students will go soul winning at least two hours each week.
- 3. Students will serve in the ministry of the Central Baptist Church (or another approved church) in some Christian service capacity each week.
- 4. Ladies will wear skirts or dresses which are no shorter than the bottom of the knee when sitting or standing. Skirts will not be slit higher than the bottom of the knee.
- 5. Men will wear dress shirts and ties to class.
- 6. Men will be clean-shaven and have an appropriate masculine haircut (off the collar and ears, tapered on the sides and in the back).
- 7. Faddish hairstyles are unacceptable for ladies or men.
- 8. Men are not to wear earrings, necklaces or bracelets with the exception of medical identification bands.

A complete set of rules is available in the Student Handbook.



Chapel Services

Our Bible college students have the privilege of hearing from men who are building great churches. Over 150 different preachers have preached in college chapels services. Church planters, veteran pastors from across the Northeast, and missionaries from around the globe are scheduled to preach in every chapel service. These faithful men of God bring with them their ministry experience, Bible knowledge, and Spirit-filled sermons which make every chapel unique and challenging. Students often testify that their



lives have been changed and the will of God made clear because of the preaching of the Word of God.

Several opportunities are available in the music department. Our college choir and singing ensembles represent the college in churches, Christian schools, and conferences.







Athletics and Special Activities


Students enjoy activities each month. Hiking, bowling, mini-golf, sledding, classical concerts are among the activities planned. Our college basketball team competes each year, providing the students with exciting games. The Christimas Banquet and Valentine Banquet are favorites.













General Information

- 1. Students must obtain permission from the Administration to leave campus if they will be absent during scheduled classes or chapel.
- 2. Extra-curricular programs and functions must be approved in advance by the Administration.
- 3. Students must purchase all required materials for their courses. Instructors will determine if students have all required materials by the second Monday after classes begin.

Class Absences

Class attendance and participation are vital to the learning process. All students are expected to attend all chapel services and scheduled class sessions of the courses in which they are enrolled.

- 1. Students will be permitted class absences equivalent to twice the number of times the class meets per week. Students whose absences exceed two times the number of class meetings per week, will risk failing the course. Teachers are allowed to deduct two percentage points from the final grade for each absence over the allowed amount.
- 2. If a student has a class on a chapel day or is on campus, he must attend chapel.
- 3. Late registration for any semester requires special permission and the payment of the late registration fee.
- 4. No absences apart from illness are allowed during special church or college meetings (i.e. Bible Conference, Missions Conference, etc.).
- 5. A "go-home" schedule is published each semester.

# Tardiness

- 1. A student is considered tardy if he enters the classroom after class has begun.
- 2. Students who are tardy must check with the instructor after class to make sure he has not been counted absent.
- 3. Three tardies equal one absence.
- 4. Habitual tardiness may be addressed with demerits.

Courses marked I, W, WP, or AU are not calculated in the grade point average. Courses will be marked with W, WP, or WF upon voluntary withdrawal only. The student may not have more than 90 days to complete the requirements set forth by the instructor.

The grade point average is computed by dividing the total grade points earned by the total hours attempted. An average of "C" is required for graduation from New England Baptist College. Therefore, a student must have an accumulative grade point average of at least 2.000 to graduate.

The grade point average is based on the courses completed at New England Baptist College. Courses transferred from other institutions are not counted into the grade point average. Only those students who complete at least 80 credit hours at New England Baptist College will be considered for the honors of valedictorian and salutatorian.

Heademic Qoad

Students planning to complete their course of study in four years must typically enroll in a minimum of 16 credit hours per semester. A student is considered "full-time" if he is enrolled in at least 12 credit hours.

Heademic Probation

Students who have a GPA of less than 1.5000 at the end of any semester will be placed on Academic Probation and be required to enroll in a reduced class load the next semester. Students who complete two consecutive semesters on Academic Probation without improvement may be required to sit out one semester, at the discretion of the Administration.

Registration

Registration is held at the beginning of each semester. The student is expected to choose his courses and arrange his class schedule with the assistance and approval of an academic advisor. Returning students may pre-register for the upcoming semester at a time announced in the previous term. A student cannot register without official acceptance.

Transcripts

New England Baptist College student transcripts are released only at the written request of the student. Transcripts will not be released until all financial obligations have been finalized. A \$5 fee may be charged.





# A WORD FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Private lessons are available to all students and are crucial times of personal musical development. Experienced and well-qualified instructors encourage and guide students to develop their singing and/or playing.

Recitals are the culmination of the student's work. This gives others the chance to enjoy and be blessed by the student's progress. Senior recitals are required of all music majors. A shared recital is required for those students choosing to demonstrate a proficiency in music.

# Bible (BI)

# **BI 101 Old Testament Survey**

A brief study of each book of the Old Testament including: authorship, theme, date, helpful background, and purpose. Three credit hours.

# BI 102 New Testament Survey

A brief study of each book of the New Testament including: authorship, theme, date, helpful background, and purpose. Three credit hours.

# **BI 201 Bible Customs and Geography**

A course designed to help the Bible student use geography to explain selected passages of Scripture and to understand the customs of the Middle East which illuminate Biblical history and truth. Two credit hours.

# **BI 202** Bible Study Tools

A course designed to acquaint the serious student of the Bible with the available study books (tools) and instruction on how and when to use them. Two credit hours.

# BI 203 Romans

The study of the doctrinal message of this book as to authorship, theme, outline, and practical application. Two credit hours.

# BI 204 Acts

The study of this book includes authorship, time, theme, and special emphasis on the beginnings of the early New Testament Church. Two credit hours.

# **BI 205** Galatians

The study of this book presents the glorious gospel message defended against those who were seeking to substitute legality for grace. Two credit hours.

# **BI 208** Philippians and Colossians

The study of the books of Philippians and Colossians in relation to the Christian life with special emphasis for young people and the newly saved. Two credit hours.

# **BI 209** Pastoral Epistles

The study of Timothy and Titus with special emphasis on pastoral leadership including the qualifications of the message and the charge to the pastor. Two credit hours.

# **BI 210** General Epistles

A systematic study of the books of James through Jude, setting forth the doctrine of salvation in order to clarify the distinct difference between Judaism and Christianity, proclaiming the Christian's position as a son of God, and warning them against apostasy. Two credit hours.

## **BI 215** The New Testament Church

A course designed to present the New Testament Church as the plan of God in this age for the propagation of the Gospel to a lost and dying world and to study the early church's growth and success. Two credit hours.

## BI 216 [TH 202] Bibliology

A detailed study of the inspiration, replication, and preservation of the Scriptures. An examination of the superiority of the *Textus Receptus* Greek text and the English Authorized Version. Three credit hours.

# BI 301 Genesis

An exposition of the first book of the Bible with emphasis given to authorship, Creation, the Fall, the Flood, and the Abrahamic Covenant. Three credit hours.

## **BI 302** Pentateuch

The study of the first five books of the Bible with emphasis on authorship, purpose, and theme. Three credit hours.

# BI 303, 304 Historical Books I, II

The study of Joshua through Esther giving the early conquerings in the Promised Land, the period of the judges, the reign of the kings, and the eventual fall of the divided kingdoms. Two semesters, three credit hours each.

# BI 306 Wisdom Books

The study of the books of Job through Song of Solomon with emphasis on the poetic literature of the Bible. Three credit hours.

# BI 307, 308 Prophets I, II

A study of the prophetic books of the Bible from Isaiah through Malachi giving a chronological account of the way that God dealt with His people. Two semesters, three credit hours each.

# BI 309 Christ in the Old Testament

An exhaustive look at Jesus Christ in the Old Testament. Two credit hours.

# **BI 401 Gospels**

A study of the four Gospels giving the events of Christ's life and His teachings. These books are taught chronologically so that the student walks with Christ through the Holy Land. Two credit hours.

# BI 402 1 Corinthians

The study of the order, the calling and the discipline of the early New Testament Church. Two credit hours.

# **BI 404 Hebrews**

A study of the position of Christ and His "better" covenant accomplished through His blood. Two credit hours.

# **BI 405 Revelation**

The study of the things to come as set forth in the last book of the Bible. Two credit hours.

# Business/Office Administration (BU)

# BU 101, 102 Keyboarding I, II

Beginning keyboarding techniques for those who have not had previous training. Secretarial and business education students will be tested for proficiency and possible credit. Class meets five days each week. Two semesters, three credit hours each.

# **BU 103 Business Machines**

Instruction in the efficient use of machines used in the office. Three credit hours.

# **BU 104 Database Applications**

A presentation and application of various database software systems and their use in the church and school office. Two credit hours. Prerequisites: BU 101 and 102.

# **BU 105 Desktop Publishing**

Practical application of various desktop publishing systems to design and produce quality projects from the church and school office. Two credit hours. Prerequisites: BU 101 and 102.

# **BU 106 Business Mathematics**

A study of basic mathematics and applications to the business world. Three credit hours. *Alternate*: MA 102 College Mathematics.

# **BU 121 Introduction to Business**

A study of the structure, history, organization, and purpose of the business world. Two credit hours.

# **BU 201 Basic Accounting Principles**

A course which introduces accounting concepts including debits and credits, assets and liabilities, financial statements, payroll aspects, and the use of computerized bookkeeping. Two credit hours.





# **BU 202 Intermediate Computer**

A course designed to practically equip the student with useful knowledge and greater skill in Word, Excel, and database applications. Two credit hours. (Compare with MA 301). Prerequisites: BU 101 & 102 Keyboarding I & II.

# **BU 204 Secretarial Procedures**

Training the office secretary to be efficient and productive within the office setting. Two credit hours.

# BU 205, 206 Word Processing I, II

Typing for speed, accuracy, and form from transcribing machines. Special emphasis is given to the word processor and software. BU 206 meets five days each week. Two semesters, three credit hours each. Prerequisites: BU 101 and 102.

# BU 207, 208 Speed Writing I, II

Training for the rapid reading of shorthand transcripts with introduction to dictation and translation skills. Class meets five days each week. Two semesters, three credit hours each.

## **BU 209 Business Communications**

The study of proper business letters and other forms of communication, providing up-to-date information that will prepare students for working in offices. Students will study information processing, telephone procedures and record keeping, basic communications, and decision making. The emphasis is on everyday skills and knowledge needed to be successful. Two credit hours.

# Christian Ministries (CM)

# CM 101, 102 Leadership I, II

A course exploring the problems and methods of church ministry and the practical biblical preparation that will enable the student to successfully serve. Two semesters, two credit hours each.

# CM 103 Personal Evangelism

A study of the methods, message, and importance of the command to spread the Gospel. Includes the practical application of the methods presented. Two credit hours.

# CM 104 Computer Applications

A basic introduction to Word, Excel and Powerpoint and the utilization of these programs to the church and school environment. Two credit hours.

# CM 202 Christian Home

A study of the biblical structure of the home and the answers to the problems which arise from family relationships. Two credit hours.

# CM 204 Christian Leader's Wife

A course designed to train young women to be effective partners in the ministry into which God calls their husbands. Two credit hours.

## CM 206 Visual Aids

A course designed to introduce students to the various teaching aids that are available and the skills required to construct and utilize these resources in lesson preparation and presentation. Two credit hours.

## CM 207, 208 Women of the Bible I, II

Building upon the foundation of a study of women of the Old Testament and then of the New, these courses will help the Christian lady apply biblical principles for Christian living in her home, church, and personal life. Two credit hours each.

## CM 221 Summer Ministries

Vacation Bible School; Neighborhood Bible Time, backyard clubs; day trips; Mom's Morning Out. Summer is an opportunity to mnister to kids at home and their parents.





# CM 222 Church Bus Basics

An examination of the purpose, policies, and personnel needed to carry out an effecive bus ministry. Also an introduction to the various aspects of children's church philosophy, organization, and operation. Two credit hours.

# CM 301 Teaching Children

A course designed to prepare students to teach the Bible to children in an interesting and applicable way using various methods and materials. Two credit hours. (Compare with ED 308)

# CM 304 Christian Ethics

An overvciew of ethical systems encountered in the world followed by a presentation and discussion of biblical principles involved in inter-church relations, and societal issues including abortion, euthanasia, capital punishment, biomedical issues, civil disobedience, marriage and divorce, and same-sex marriage. Two credit hours.

# CM 305 Teaching Methods

A practical presentation and application of the various teaching methods and the proper preparation of lesson plans and procedures. Two credit hours.

# CM 308 Teen Ministry

An introduction to the youth ministry in the local church including: Bible teaching methods, soul winning programs, and character building activities and projects. Two credit hours.

# CM 309 Camp Ministry

Purpose, organization and planning for teen and children's seasonal camp weeks. Two credit hours.

# CM 401 Christian Counseling

A course designed to acquaint students with biblical counseling procedures relating theory to practical application. Three credit hours.

# CM 402 Teaching Adults

A course designed to prepare students to teach the Bible to adults in an interesting and applicable way using various methods and materials. Two credit hours.

# CM 404 Leadership Principles

An extensive study of the characteristics evident in a good Christian leader. Two credit hours.

# CM 406 Ministry Internship

A six-week experience of on-the-field observation and service in the ministerial student's major concentration. Pastoral and associated ministries will serve under an approved pastor, youth director, music director, bus director, or Christian education director for the entire six weeks. Missions majors will spend six weeks on a foreign mission field under the direction of an approved, veteran missionary. Credit for this course may be given to those who have satisfactorily served full-time at least one year in their chosen field and who have the recommendation of those with whom they served. Four credit hours.

# Early Childhood Education (EC)

# EC 201 Early Childhood Development

This course is a study of the preschool child's physical, emotional, mental, social, and spiritual development. Emphasis is placed on promoting maturation in relationship to the preschool child's learning ability. Three credit hours.

# EC 301 Preschool Administration

(*Prerequisite: the student should be at least junior level*)

This course is designed to help students understand the organization and operation of various aspects of a preschool ministry. Two credit hours.





# EC 302 Preschool Teaching Methods

(Prerequisite: the student should be at least junior level)

This course is a study of the methods and materials used in teaching preschool through kindergarten children. Two credit hours.

# EC 407 Early Childhood Practicum

(Prerequisite: the student should be at least junior level and have completed EC 302) This course is a practical field experience for students preparing for ministry in a preschool setting. Students observe and assist in the care/teaching of infant through three year-old children. Two credit hours.

# Education (ED)

# **ED 101 Introduction to Education**

A survey of the profession and calling of the teacher's life in the classroom. Includes practical observation in the secondary and elementary classrooms. Two credit hours.

# ED 102 Teaching Elementary Art

A study of the materials, methods, and procedures of creative teaching of art for pre-school through sixth grade students. Two credit hours.

# ED 201 Teaching Elementary Reading

Instruction and practice in phonetic reading and comprehension from pre-school through the sixth grade curricula. Two credit hours.

# ED 204 Child Development

A course designed for teachers, parents, and youth leaders providing a study of the psychological factors of development of children from birth to young adult. Three credit hours.

# ED 206 Learning Theory

A study of the elements of learning including: motivation, attention, interest, grouping, and teacher-student roles. Three credit hours.

# **ED 301** Teaching Methods

A practical presentation and application of the various teaching methods and the proper preparation of lesson plans and procedures. Two credit hours.

# ED 304 Teaching Elementary History

A course presenting the materials and methods for teaching history in the elementary grades. Two credit hours.

# ED 305 Children's Literature

A study of the available literature that should be presented to the elementary student and the methods of teaching it effectively. Two credit hours.

# ED 306 Teaching Elementary Music

Elementary education students learn how to teach music (theory, songs, rhythm, etc.) and construct school programs in a Christian school environment. Two credit hours.

# ED 307 Teaching Elementary Language

A course examining the materials and methods of the elementary English language curricula. Two credit hours.

# ED 308 Teaching Bible in the

**Elementary School** A course designed to prepare students to teach the Bible to children in an interesting and applicable way using various methods and materials. Two credit hours. (Alt. CM201)

# ED 309 Teaching Elementary Math and

**Science** A course designed to acquaint the elementary teacher with the proper sequence and objectives of mathematics and science; and the opportunity to learn ways to use visuals and games to teach mathematical and scientific concepts. Three credit hours.

# ED 310 Development of American Education

An analysis of education in the United States, the rise of the public school system, and the strength of the Christian school in the late 1900's. Three credit hours.

# ED 401 Education of Exceptional Children

A study of the mentally gifted, mentally challenged, physically handicapped, and learning disabled. Two credit hours.

# ED 402 Tests and Measurements

A study of teacher-made tests and standardized tests and their application to the classroom and for the evaluation and diagnosis of students. Three credit hours.

# ED 403 Elementary Curriculum

A study of the learning patterns of elementary children and the curricula requirements at the various age levels. Three credit hours.

# ED 404 School Administration

A course designed to acquaint students with the organization and operation of a school as to curricula, finances, community, teacher, parent, and student leadership decisions. Two credit hours.

# ED 405 Philosophy of Christian Education

A study of the general history, biblical basis and philosophy of education, and the need for a distinctively Christian philosophy as contrasted with huministic education. Three credit hours.

# ED 406 Classroom Discipline

A course presenting the procedures and attitudes necessary for the successful management of the Christian school classroom. Two credit hours.

# ED 407 Teaching Practicum

A course designed to give an opportunity for the student teacher to observe and experience a classroom. Preparation for ED 408. Two credit hours.

# ED 408 Observation and Student Teaching

A course designed for last-semester seniors in the education department and includes classroom observation, writing lesson plans, grading papers, recording grades, and teaching a minimum of 40 classroom hours. All students will be expected to fulfill the daily time requirements. Eight credit hours.

# English (EN)

# EN 099 English Fundamentals

A study of English grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, and usage for students who are not able to take EN101 because of ACT scores and/or entrance examination scores. At least a "C" must be earned in this course before enrolling in EN101. No credit will be earned for this course.

# EN 101 English Grammar

This course designed to equip the student to write with with proper paragraphs, punctuation, and grammar. Emphasis is given to the use of proper grammar as the student completes assignments for college courses. Three credit hours.

# EN 102 English Composition

Courses designed to equip the student for writing effective compositions with proper paragraphs, punctuation, and grammar. Emphasis is given to the writing of essays and research papers. The critical analysis of selected literary works is presented throughout the courses. Three credit hours.

# EN 201 American Literature Survey

A courses which surveys the literature of the American people and the historical periods of the authors. Three credit hours.





# EN 202 British Literature Survey

A courses which surveys the literature of Great Britain and the historical periods of the authors. Three credit hours.

# EN 301 Advanced American Literature

A course which explores the development of literature of the American people. The works of specific authors are analyzed for their contributions to the body of English language literature. Three credit hours.

# EN 302 Advanced British Literature

A course which explores the development of literature of Great Britain. The works of specific authors are analyzed for their contributions to the body of English literature. Three credit hours.

# EN 305 Children's Literature

A study of the available literature that should be presented to the elementary student and the methods of teaching it effectively. Three credit hours.

# EN 306 English Novel

A study of the historical development and technique of the novels of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Three credit hours.

# **EN 307** Introduction to Literature

A course designed to introduce the student to various genres of prose and poetry. Three credit hours.

# **EN 308 Effective Writing**

A course to help students present their ideas in written form in an effective, persuasive, and professional manner. Three credit hours.

# EN 309 Speech

A general course in the art of speaking with emphasis on voice production, voice development, basics of platform manner, and practice in presenting various types of speeches. Two credit hours.

# EN 401 Short Story

A study of the historical development and technique of the short story as written by American, British, and other European authors. Three credit hours.

# EN 403 Advanced Grammar

A course which includes an intensive study of descriptive English grammar and examines the structure and usage of current language. Three credit hours.

# History (HI)

# HI 101, 102 History of Western Civilization I, II

A general survey of the culture and civilization of the West, including ideas, economics, institutions, progress, and development. Two semesters, three credit hours each.

# HI 200 Foundations of America

An overview of the events and values which shaped the establishment of our nation, and an examination of the three branches of federal government. 2 credit hours.

# HI 201, 202 United States History I, II

A study of the American nation politically, socially, and economically as to sectional-ism, capitalism, imperialism, and other motivating factors. Two semesters, three credit hours each.

# HI 301 Early Church History

A brief survey of the Christian church from the time of Christ until the present with special emphasis given the early church. Three credit hours.

# HI 302 Baptist History

A study of the foundations, structure, and current trends of the Baptist church in America and around the world. Three credit hours.





# HI 303 Age of the Reformation

A course of study which includes the political, social, and economic climate in Europe from 1350 to 1650. Three credit hours.

# HI 305 Recent American History

A study of the social, religious, and political changes of the 20th century and the continuing impact in 21st.

# HI 310 Development of American Education

An analysis of education in the United States, the rise of the public school system, and the strength of the Christian school in the late 1900's. Three credit hours.

# HI 401 World Geography

The study of the countries of the world in respect to politcal and cultural values, biblical understanding, and world evangelism. Three credit hours.

# HI 402 American Government

An indepth study of the three branches of our governmental system and the Constitution from which they receive their power. Three credit hours.

# Home Economics (HE)

# HE 201 Food Preparation and Safety

A study of basic food preparation, meal planning, and serving in a variety of ways for all occasions. Three credit hours.

# HE 202 Nutrition

A study of the science of nutrition and the application to dietary planning. Two credit hours.

## HE 303 Child Development

A course designed for teachers, parents, and youth leaders providing a study of the psychological factors of development of children from birth to young adult. Three credit hours.

# HE 403 Home Management

A study of the problems of the homemaker including finances, clothing, nutrition, recreation, and education. Three credit hours.

# Mathematics (MA)

# MA 100 Mathematics Fundamentals

A basic course presenting number manipulation, fractions, decimals, percentages, and introductory algebra to equip the student for college algebra, MA 201. Students who are not able to take MA 201 because of entrance examination scores must succeed in this course with at least a "C" before enrolling in MA 201. Meets three hours per week. No credit is earned for this course.

# MA 102 College Mathematics

A survey course of basic mathematics and its principles. The student will review basic mathematical operations, principles, and concepts of arithmetic, geometry, and algebra. Three credit hours.

## MA 201 College Algebra

A study of functions and graphs which includes systems of equations and practical application. Three credit hours.

## MA 202 Trigonometry

The study of methods of solving triangles which includes the trigonometric functions, logarithms, and identities. Three credit hours.

## MA 301 Intermediate Computer

A course designed to practically equip the student with useful knowledge and greater skill in Word, Excel, and database applications. Two credit hours. (Compare with BU 202). Prerequisites: BU 101 & 102 Keyboarding I & II.





# MA 302 Advanced Computer

A course in BASIC language programming providing an in-depth study of the techniques of this computer language. Three credit hours. Prerequisites: BU 101 & 102 Keyboarding I & II.

# MA 303, 304, 305 Calculus I, II, III

The study of analytic geometry, differential and integral calculus, coordinate systems, and the application of each concept. Three semesters, three credit hours each.

# MA 306 Probability

An introduction to the basic precepts of probability including conditional, counting, and decision-making applications including measures of central tendency, variability, centiles, standard scores, the normal curve, and correlation. Three credit hours.

# MA 307 Linear Algebra

An introduction to the basic precepts of matrices, quadratic forms, vector spaces, linear transformation, determinants, and other related topics. Three credit hours.

# MA 401 College Geometry

An analysis of the foundations of Euclidean and non-Euclidean geometry including the history of geometry and the men involved. Three credit hours.

# MA 403 History and Development of Mathematics

A survey of the history and development of important concepts and methods and the mathematicians involved. Three credit hours.

# Missions (MI)

# **MI 102 Introduction to Missions**

The presentation of biblical-based missions with elements found throughout Scripture. The qualifications and call of the missionary are studied in this course. Two credit hours.

# **MI 201** History of Missions

A survey of the progress of missions throughout history and the study of the lives of great missionaries. Two credit hours.

# MI 203 Cults

A study of the major religious cults of the world: Jehovah Witnesses, Mormons, Church of Christ, Christian Scientists, Scientology, Atheists, and others. Two credit hours.

# MI 204 World Religions

A survey of the major world religions: Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Shintoism, Islam, Mormonism, and others. Two credit hours.

# MI 205 Missions in the Local Church

The study of the missionary program of the local Baptist church that effectively extends the evangelistic outreach to the ends of the earth. Two credit hours.

# **MI 209** Theology of Missions

The biblical foundation and authority of the mission program of the local Baptist church. Two credit hours.

# **MI 301** Practical Missions Construction

General instruction in the skills of carpentry, plumbing, electricity, auto mechanics, and other abilities needed in the missionary's life on the mission field. Two credit hours.

# MI 302 Missionary Methods

A study of the various methods of establishing churches in new areas and training national pastors to continue the work. Two semesters, two credit hours each.

# **MI 303 Linguistics**

A study of the human speech organs, types of sound produced, methods of transcribing and categorizing them into written forms of previously unwritten languages. Three credit hours.



# MI 401 Issues of Missiology

A course designed to prepare the missionary student for situations that will be faced on the mission field. Two credit hours.

# MI 402 Mission Training Camp

Practical training that prepares the missionary candidate for deputation and the steps involved in getting to the field. Two credit hours.

# Music (MU)

CC 101, 102, 201, 202, 301, 302, 401, 402 College Choir (8 semesters possible.) Participating in college choir. One credit hour each.

CO 101, 102, 201, 202, 301, 302, 401, 402 College Orchestra (8 semesters possible.) Participating in orchestra. One credit hour each.

CC 101, 102, 201, 202, 301, 302, 401, 402 College Choir. Participating in college choir. One credit hour each.

**PI 101, 102, 201, 202, 301, 302, 401, 402 Private Instrument Lesson.** One half-hour lesson each week; music majors forty-five minute lessons. One credit hour each.

PO 101, 102, 201, 202, 301, 302, 401, 402 Private Organ Lesson. One half-hour lesson each week; music majors forty-five minute lessons. One credit hour each.

**PP 101, 102, 201, 202, 301, 302, 401, 402 Private Piano Lesson.** One half-hour lesson each week; music majors forty-five minute lessons. One credit hour each.

PV 101, 102, 201, 202, 301, 302, 401, 402 Private Voice Lesson. One half-hour lesson each week; music majors forty-five minute lessons. One credit hour each.

# MU 101 Philosophy of Music

A study of what the Bible says regarding music and worship. This course exposes the Contemporary Christian Music (CCM) movement as dangerous and unscriptural. Also includes principles and examples of godly music to establish good listening habits. Two credit hours.

# MU 102 Foundations of Church Music

Students will experience a basic study of music theory concepts put into practice through songleading. Pertinent music issues will also be covered. Two credit hours.

# MU 103 Music Theory I

A study of pitches, key signatures, intervals, scales, four-part writing, basic chord inversions, and beginning ear training with dictation. Four credit hours.

# MU 104 Music Theory II

(*Prerequisite: C or better in MU 103*) A study of chord inversions, non-chord tones, diatonic seventh chords, secondary dominants and continued ear training with dictation. Four credit hours.

# MU106 Beginning Hymnplaying

Students learn basic technique for accompanying evangelistic congregational singing through chording and improvisation. Two credit hours.

# MU 111-112 Vocal Instruction I, II

Students are taught the fundamental techniques of healthy singing, practice, communication, and performance while demonstrating their progress through performances of church music. Two credit hours each.

# MU 121-122 Piano Instruction I, II

Students not proficient in piano playing learn the fundamentals of good playing including scales, harmonization, classical songs and 4-part hymns. One credit hour each.





#### MU 201 Music Theory III

(*Prerequisite: C or better in MU 104*) A completion of the study of 18<sup>th</sup>/19<sup>th</sup> century harmony including secondary diminished seventh chords, augmented/ borrowed chords, modulation, musical form, and advanced ear training with dictation. Four credit hours.

### MU 203 Intro. to Music Transcription

(Prerequisite for MU305 Church Music Arranging) This course introduces the student to music notation software through project-based instruction. Two credit hours.

### MU 204 Sound & Recording Tech.

Students learn the fundamentals of sound reinforcement and recording. Students will learn both the audio theory involved and its practical application through projectbased instruction. One credit hour.

### **MU 210 Songleading**

A basic study of music skills to lead groups. This course covers basics of music reading, song leading patterns, song selection, and planning the service. Two credit hours.

#### MU 223 Principles of Accompaniment

Students are taught the differences between accompanying for various musical settings and musicians. The course will also include emphasis on creating accompaniments. Two credit hours.

#### MU 301 Music History

Music in Western culture from Bible times to the present is highlighted in this course. Concisely introduces the student to the significant composers who have shaped the history of music. Three credit hours.

#### MU 303 Vocal/Piano Pedagogy

Students learn the different pedagogical methods involved in teaching voice and piano while implementing them into peertaught lessons. Two credit hours

## MU 305 Church Music Arranging

(*Prerequisite: MU 203*) A study of the composition process and arranging rules/ techniques with practical writing for choral/instrumental groups. Music notation software is utilized in class assignments. Two credit hours.

## MU 307 Teaching Music

(*Prerequisite: ED 301 Teaching Methods*) Students learn how to integrate the fundamentals of music into elementary and secondary level classes for the Christian school through lectures and peer-teaching. Two credit hours.

### MU 308 Conducting

The student will learn conducting techniques related to personal study, rehearsal, and performance of choral and instrumental music. Two credit hours.

### MU 310 Music Ed. Practicum

(Taken interterm <u>after</u> Fall Semester Junior year) During the interterm break, the student observes music classes and lessons in a Christian school. Observation reports and projects are completed and mailed in as class requirements. One credit hour..

## MU 311-312 Instrumental Methods I, II

Students learn to play and teach strings, woodwind, brass, and percussion instruments. Two credit hours each.

## MU 321-322 Hymnplaying I, II

Students learn traditional improvisation techniques for playing hymns and evangelistic/gospel songs. Students apply these principles by playing for chapel and church services. Two credit hours each.

## MU 400 Church Music Administration

Students learn how to implement administrative guidelines for the music program of a church with topics including philosophy, planning, budgeting, music education, etc. Two credit hours.



## MU 401 Hymnology

A historical study of hymns from the Psalms to the major hymns of the New Testament Church. Two credit hours.

## MU 402 Choral Methods

Students are taught choral conducting techniques, score reading, and effective rehearsal methods. Two credit hours.

## MU 403 Accompaniment Practicum

The student is assigned to accompany vocalist, choirs, or other music groups at the direction of the instructor. One credit hour.

## Physical Education (PE)

## PE 101, 102 Physical Education I, II

Includes physical activity for the college student including, but not limited to: physical fitness, volleyball, basketball, and soccer. One credit hour each.

## PE 201 Physical Education Methods

A study of the methods and materials required for teaching physical education in the Christian school. Two credit hours.

## PE 202 Introduction to Coaching

An orientation to the philosophy and principles involved in coaching team sports. Two credit hours.

## PE 301 Minor Sports

A study of the rules and techniques of several of the minor sports including: racquetball, tennis, golf, and ping-pong. Two credit hours.

## PE 302 Rules and Officiating

A detailed study of the rules in the major sports and officiating techniques. Two credit hours.

## PE 303 First Aid and Athletic Training

Instruction in the proper methods of first aid and accident prevention. Two credit

# hours.

## PE 303 First Aid and Athletic Training

## PE 304 Kinesiology

A study of human motion in relation to sport skills. Two credit hours

## PE 401 Administration of Athletics

A consideration of the duties and responsibilities of the physical education teacher or Christian school coach. Two credit hours.

## PE 402 Coaching Basketball

A study of the methods and techniques of coaching basketball. One credit hour.

## PE 403 Coaching Volleyball

A study of the methods and techniques of coaching volleyball. One credit hour.

## PE 404 Coaching Soccer

A study of the methods and techniques of coaching soccer. One credit hour.

## PE 405 Coaching Baseball & Softball

A study of the methods and techniques of coaching baseball and softball. One credit hour.

## PE 406 Coaching Track & Field

A study of the methods and techniques of coaching track and field. One credit hour.

## PE 407 The Elementary PE Program

A study of the methods of organization techniques for planning and instituting an elementary physical education program. One credit hour.

## Pastoral Studies (PS)

## PS 201, 202 Biblical Greek I, II

A thorough study of Greek vocabulary, grammar, forms, and syntax from the Greek New Testament. Two semesters, three credit hours each.



## PS 205 Discipleship

Principles, guidelines, and methods in the discipling of new converts. Two credit hours.

### PS 303 Pastoral Theology

A course designed to examine the calling and commitment of pastoring including spiritual life, soul winning, duties, church officers, sermon preparation, business meetings, weddings, funerals, etc. Two credit hours.

### PS 305, 306 Homiletics I, II

A practical study of sermon preparation and presentation for the ministerial student. Two semesters, two credit hours.

### **PS 403** Church Planting

A course which presents the biblical program for established churches to reproduce themselves by starting and supporting new independent Baptist churches. Two credit hours.

# **PS 404** Church Finance and Administration

A course designed to train the pastoral student to be an efficient administrator of the church finances and buildings and an effective director of the people and programs of the church ministries. Two credit hours.

## Science (SC)

# SC 201 Physical Science (without laboratory requirement)

A general course of the study of the basic precepts of chemistry, physics, geology, astronomy, and meteorology. Three credit hours.

# SC 201L Physical Science (with laboratory requirement)

A general course of the study of the basic precepts of chemistry, physics, geology, astronomy, and meteorology. A laboratory class must be taken during the same semester. Four credit hours.

## SC 202 Biology

A general course of the study of basic precepts in botany and zoology. A laboratory class must be taken during the same semester. Four credit hours.

### SC 205 Scientific Creationism

A course designed to show the relation of the Bible with all of creation as found in scientific experimentation and observation. It will be shown that no conflict exists between the Bible and true science. Two credit hours.

### SC 301, 302 Chemistry I, II

A study of the science of chemistry including atomic structure, chemical bonding, chemical reactions, etc. A laboratory class must be taken during the same semester. Two semesters, four credit hours each.

## SC 401, 402 Physics I, II

A study of the science of physics including motion, mechanics, momentum, energy, heat, light, magnetism, and electricity. A laboratory class must be taken during the same semester. Two semesters, four credit hours each.

## SC 403 Geology

A study of the earth's surface in relation to creation and scriptural evidence. Three credit hours.

#### SC 404 Astronomy

A study of the earth, moon, sun, planets, comets, and stars in relation to creation and scriptural evidence. Three credit hours.





## SC 405 Physiology

An extensive study of the human body systems with emphasis on the fact that man is wondrously made by the God of Creation. Three credit hours.

## Sign Language (SL)

## SL 221 American Sign Language I

An introducation to American Sign Language. The vocabulary, grammar, and cultural aspects of the language are presented along with the associated facial expressions and body language. Two credit hours.

## SL 222 American Sign Language II

A continuation of the introducation to American Sign Language SL 221. Conversational signing skills are emphasized through interactive exercises. Two credit hours.

## SL 321 American Sign Language III

This course is designed to improve the student's expressive and receptive signing skills through advanced grammatical exercises and sign language expressions. Two credit hours.

## SL 322 American Sign Language IV

This course is a continuation of SL 321 and is designed to build upon the student's expressive and receptive signing skills through advanced grammatical exercises and sign language expressions. Two credit hours.

# Special Education (SE)

## SP 202 Special Education Diagnosis

A survey of assessment procedures for identifying educational needs, including an overview of formal assessments utilized by professionals as well as a presentation of informal assessment procedures for practical use by the classroom teacher. Two credit

# SP 401 Education of Exceptional Children

A study of the intellectually gifted, intellectually disabled, physically handicapped, and learning disabledand the methods developed to meet their educational potential. Two credit hours.

# Theology (TH)

## TH 101 Bible Doctrines I

A systematic study of the doctrines of the Bible including the nature and attributes of God; the doctrine of theTrinity; the Person and work of Jesus Christ; the Person, work, and gifts of the Holy Spirit; the Creation of all things; and the sinful fall of Mankind in Adam. Three credit hours.

## TH 102 Bible Doctrines II

A systematic study of the doctrines of the Bible including our Salvation in Christ Jesus; Angels and Demons; the local Church, its origin, purpose, offices, ordinances, and membership; the inspiration, preservation and translation of the Scriptures; end times Prophecy from a premillennial, dispensational viewpoint. Three credit hours.

## TH 202 Bibliology

A detailed study of the inspiration, replication, and preservation of the Scriptures. An examination of the superiority of the *Textus Receptus* Greek text and the English Authorized Version. Three credit hours.

## TH 203 Baptist Distinctives

A study of the biblical foundation and historical context of Baptist church doctrine, polity, and practice. Three credit hours.

## TH 301 Hermeneutics I

The study of methods and principles of biblical interpretation giving particular attention to the nature and structure of Scripture. Three credit hours.

### TH 302 Hermeneutics II

(*Prerequisite: TH 301*) A comparison of inductive and deductive Bible study methodology with a detailed comparison of Dispensational interpretation versus Calvinism. Three credit hours.

#### **TH 401** Contemporary Theology

The purpose of this class is to outline the key theological movements in Christendom between the years 1850 to present and historically trace how these trends impact fundamentalism. The student will be challenged to think through the theological issues facing the church and stand firm in Christ. Two credit hours.

### TH 402 Premillennialism

The systematic study of the Second Coming of Christ. Premillennialism is presented as the basis for the interpretation of all prophetic passages of Scripture. Two credit hours.

#### **TH 405 Biblical Holiness**


The presentation of biblical principles and motivations for separation from worldly life style choices which offend a holy God and separation unto godliness and righteous living. Three credit hours.

#### **TH 407** Christian Apologetics

This class will examine prevalent world views people have about God, humanity, and the natural world including atheism, deism, pantheism, naturalism, and nihilism. Christians can defend our faith against any and all of these forces. Two credit hours.
